"When you walk in the path of your mother, you learn to walk like her."

A study of US History 1820-1913 through the eyes of revolutionary, Araminta (Harriet Tubman). We follow her amazing life from beginning to end. We visit her grandparents during the middle passage 1750s. Araminta's dreams and Vincent Harding's There Is A River takes us there.

We visit those who inspired her, like Nat Turner, and those she inspired - Federick Douglass, Frances Ellen Watkins Harper, Sojourner Truth, etc. We examine her effect on the politics of the day, and her collaboration with John Brown.

A major section focuses on the Civil War and her role as soldier, general, spy, business woman, and doctor. Araminta's struggles and WEB Dubois' Black Reconstruction gives us a grand picture of the Civil War -before, during and after.

Finally, Araminta's twilight years gives us a unique look at the US world after the physical captivity of Afrikans was abolished, as we entered the 20th century.







Got Haiti on the brain today. Most days lately. Here is a preview from the course/study group I'm putting together called "Haiti from the bottom". Do yourself a favor and listen to the song here: http://www.ayaed.com/weekend/haiti.htm . Give it a quick listen. Where does the song take you? What do you see/feel as you listen? What historical experience/s do you imagine gives birth to this song? Who do you imagine is the "I" in the song? Is the song literal or figurative for you?

"During this course we will embark on a journey. Together we will journey from the very beginnings of the nation we now know as Haiti. We will journey through pain unimaginable and triumph unparalleled. We will journey through cycles of division and connection.

Our guides along this journey will be the songs, stories, proverbs and oral history of the Haitian people. Our approach to this course will be to study the story of Haiti from the lens of those who experienced and shaped it, its people. We will use visual art, film footage, archival recordings, and the songs and culture of the people to bring this story life. Periodically, we will reference academic and/or political histories to contextualize our study.

Along our journey we will discuss thoughts, feelings, discoveries and lessons that arise. We will discuss the implications of our study for Afrikans in Haiti today, Afrikans in America, and black people worldwide. The aim of this course is to have participants explore together the story of Haiti in all of its dimensions and incarnations; not merely intellectually, emotionally as well. Participants will walk away from the course having become intimate with Haiti's story and inspired to learn more and to act for Haiti and for ourselves. Key themes of our study will be:

- . Makandal and Maroonage- weaving unity, sowing seeds
- ii. Haitian Revolution and the founding of Haiti- birthing, reaping, and resistance
- iii. Internal Division- mulattoes vs. blacks, class division
- iv. Land Parceling and Lakou Development
- v. Vodou- the birth of Haiti's national culture, tool of liberation or tool of oppression?
- vi. Memory in Haiti- Africa in the West
- vii. The Cacos Rebellion and the U.S. Occupation
- viii. The Duvalier era
- ix. Aristide and the coups

Please join us as we uncover the one of the most powerful and inspiring stories in the history of the world, the story of Haiti.



This is one of those courses culled from college text. Why do students have to wait until college for us to acknowledge that they are influenced by and interested in literature (including oral literature and film). This course is adapted from the book Writing About Literature by Edgar V. Roberts, and is supplemented by various storytellers on this page.

It's adapted to fit middle and high school grade levels. The expectation and depth of student oral and written responses will reflect their age and exposure levels. Sometimes younger students will surprise you!



Another way we augment the text is to add a section called "The Literature of Your Family." Students are asked to take an inventory of the written and oral literature of their families (nuclear, extended, and ancestral) and place them into the categories of literature (nonfiction prose, fiction prose, drama, and poetry). This is a critical section for it introduces literature by bringing the students closer to their families, to learning more about their families.

In short, it's designed to **heal alienation born of oppression**, and to put the student and their families at the center of the learning. Just think about your middle and high school writing or literature classes:


Did any of them draw you closer (via knowledge or affinity) to your family and our people?




If you can name just one course, you're extremely fortunate. This is a conscious mis-education strategy to alienate us from ourselves, our family, our culture, and our people while simultaneously creating an affinity - in us - to those who mean us no good.

Our methods are designed to counter that strategy; designed to heal the alienation so that our students

can use their writing in service of their families and our people.

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



The courses is an expansion on the DVD of the same name. Parents and educators learn eight essential elements that block critical thinking development for our children, youth and adults that are ignored by traditional academic critical thinking curricula. Most important, you'll learn how to retify the issues and remove the blocks.

Core Critical Thinking Skills







Critical thinking development is natural, we mostly need to see how we can get out of the way. Participants will learn to ask deep (metaphorical) questions—i.e.: "Write directions to Waney's heart" instead of more literal ones. Attendees will learn to encourage the barage of "why?" questions.

Participants will locate and use student cultural centers for rapid decision-making. A total of eight core skills will be developed to help stimulate critical analysis, inference, interpretation, explanation, evaluation and self regulation.

The course features: "the Nurturing power of "Why?," "Location," "Parent modeling," and five additional key elements to provide educators and parents the skills needed to nurture critical thinking for our children who are often schooled in hostile or "cold" environments.

So, what does the sheep and the dog have to do with critical thinking? Well, you have to at least get the DVD to know that. You can take the course to learn how to address the contradiction.







Guest Instructors: Dr. Umoja and Dr. Mayfield Let Your Motto Be Resistance is based on two texts:





Black-owned income tax and bookeeping company.



This course provides a powerful backdrop for evaluating and understanding our condition today, especially in light of the Trayvon Martin murder and the Zimmer verdict. It also dispels a powerful myth that Black people changed our condition in the South by only holding hands, praying, singing Kumbaya and shaming White people.

Umoja shows that armed resistance was critical to the efficacy of the southern freedom struggle and the dismantling of segregation and Black disenfranchisement. Intimidation and fear were central to the system of oppression in Mississippi and most of the Deep South. Armed self-defense was a major tool of survival for some Black southern communities to maintain their integrity and existence in the face of White supremacist terror. Umoja's riveting historical narrative relies upon oral history, archival material, and scholarly literature to reconstruct the use of armed resistance by Black activists and supporters in Mississippi to challenge racist terrorism, segregation, and to fight for human rights and

political empowerment from the early 1950s through the late 1970s.



Mayfield, from just across the Missippi border in Bogalusa, LA, lived some of what Umoja reports on and provides a upclose view of how he and others overcame fear to present a significant challenge to White domination. Ironically, it was Mayfield's involvement in the struggle in Bogalusa that laid the foundation for him as a man - a family man, a community man, and a businessman. He shows how the community values that spawned the movement and the strategies that guided it have also guided his success in life and in business.

These texts provide overlooked names and hidden stories that will bring light to our children's minds now dulled by the fear of Zimerica (Zimmerman's America). Umoja and Mayfield have given us powerful tools to expand our understanding of our success in the face of extraordinary odds. Just what we need today, wouldn't you agree?

Youth to Mother:

"Mom, I'm trying to figure out where your voice ends and my voice begins."

t starts in middle school. By high school, it has morphed into a full-scale internal struggle for identity and voice. One day your teenager is the know-it-all-confident 21 year old! Next day you see the child needing cuddling and direction.

Respond to the wrong one, and you've just set off World World III right in the living room, driveway, or mall.

Though it's a highly emotional time - to say the least - this quest is understandable. Our youth are really searching for identity and significance within the larger group of peers in preparation for taking their place in society that doesn't want them.

For them, the Easter bunny has lost its mystical lore. With their new-found voices they are also trying to balance family conflicts and societal promises with their realities.

Historically, this identity progression from family-to-peer group-to-society presented few problems because family and society mirrored each other. Also, the adults understood the journey and ordered our social traditions to facilitate safe passage of our youth through this and subsequent periods of "becoming."

Fast forward to now!

Today, this tumultuous struggle is anything but natural, orderly or safe. Whether down the street or just a tweet away, the peers are often guided by different values.

The New Easter Bunny:

Corporations and others, who profit from their inner conflicts and from our community's maladies, manipulate their identity-quest into one for material things.

Betrayal: Sadly, many who we charge with helping our youth - school systems, social systems, police, etc., don't value our families, community or people. They ignore our highest aspirations and use

this tumultuous period to break youthful spirits and/or to alienate our youth from the family, community and our people.
